
OPEN TO ALL-OPEN TO GOD

QI.... "Christmas"

- No date was given in the Bible.
- Speculation of the time of year as to Christ's birth arose in the early second century.
- Was suggested that it should be 2nd May!
- The feast was not celebrated until the late fourth century.
- The earliest mention of 25th December was suggested in the year 336 and was probably chosen to oppose the festival on that date dedicated to "the sun of Righteousness."
- The popular observance of Christmas has always been accompanied with joy and merry-making (in mid winter).
- It developed considerably in England during the nineteenth century, through the importation of German customs by the Prince Consort (Albert, husband of Queen Victoria) for example the Christmas tree: and also through the influence of the writer Charles Dickens (*A Christmas Carol*)
- "The Incarnation" = that the eternal Son of God took human flesh ("became man") from his human mother (Mary) and so Jesus was at once fully God and fully man.

The hidden Christian meaning of that silly song "The Twelve Days of Christmas". Here it is....

One partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ. **Two turtle doves** - the Old and New Testaments. Three French hens for faith, hope and love. Four calling birds - the four gospels Five golden rings - first five books of the Bible. **Six geese a-laying** for the six days of creation. Seven swans a-swimming the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit: prophesy, serving, teaching, exhortation, contribution, leadership, and mercy. **Eight maids a-milking** were the eight beatitudes. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. Ten lords a-leaping the ten commandments. Eleven pipers piping the eleven faithful disciples. Twelve drummers drumming symbolised the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
