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VICAR'S VOICE

We now move into the month of March and, having experienced one of the wettest and gloomiest of winters, we can at last look forward to the spring. As we all know the weather in March continues to be unpredictable, but despite this the earth wakes up and the season turns. The vicarage garden bears witness to this, in its saturated lawn I have discovered an abundance of daffodils in tight, expectant bud.

But the turning of the seasons is not the only 'turn' to greet us as we move into this new month. March also brings with it the invitation to make our Lenten journey, a journey that calls us to 'turn' away from all that keeps us from God and towards Christ who calls us ever deeper into God's divine love.

Springtime and Lent are inextricably linked together and some of the oldest traditions of Lent are interwoven into ideas of spring. Indeed, some refer to Lent as 'springtime' for the soul and others as a time to 'spring-clean' the soul.

It is certainly a time to examine ourselves, to check out those corners we often neglect in our day-to-day lives and to

reflect deeply on what we find there. It's a time to ask ourselves those uncomfortable questions about what we rely on for our sense of self-worth and to prayerfully consider what it means to live by the grace of God.

Traditionally, one of the ways we are encouraged to do this is by giving things up. But whether we give up chocolate (a particular challenge for me!), biscuits, cake, alcohol or anything else – we do so to aid our inner 'spring clean'. Maggie Dawn in her book 'Giving it up', suggests that, we give things up '...to allow the light to be shed on those places where our idea of God is too harsh, too weak, too small, too fragile, too stern'. In other words, we give things up in order that we might see God more clearly

Spring will inevitably come, but the invitation to journey through Lent is just that, an invitation. It's an invitation for all of us and, if we're up for it, it's a journey we can make in the company of one another. I, for one, am very much looking forward to making my first Lenten journey with the faith community here and I pray that it will be a fruitful time for all.
